

North Dakota Community Health Centers: The Role of Medicaid

Community health centers (CHCs) deliver comprehensive, high-quality, affordable primary and preventive care and reduce overall costs for the health care system. CHCs improve access to essential health care services in communities with shortages of other providers, in both isolated rural and densely populated urban areas. They also integrate services such as behavioral health, substance use disorder treatment, dental care, and pharmacy. CHCs depend primarily on Medicaid and federal grants to sustain their operations.

Community Health Centers in North Dakota

CHCs have service delivery sites across the state. ¹

- North Dakota has 4 CHCs serving patients at 31 service sites.
- Of these sites, 50 percent are in rural areas.

Patients Served at Health Centers in North Dakota

- In North Dakota, 36,376 people were served by health centers in 2023, including more than:¹
 - 10,800 children under age 18 (30 percent of patients),
 - 921 veterans, and
 - 4,800 older adults age 65+.
- One third (36 percent) of patients had income at or below the federal poverty level. ¹

Quality of Care at Health Centers in North Dakota

CHCs delivered preventive and screening services to their patients. For 2023, CHCs in North Dakota reported the following. ¹

- 78 percent of pregnant patients received early prenatal care.
- 89 percent of adult patients were screened for tobacco use and got help to stop if using.
- 78 percent of patients 12 and older were screened for depression and had a follow up care plan if needed.
- 47 percent of adult patients ages 46-75 were screened for colon cancer.
- 6,046 patients with hypertension (high blood pressure) received care.
- 2,422 patients with diabetes received care.

Medicaid's Role in Sustaining CHCs in North Dakota

- The 14,379 Medicaid enrollees served by CHCs in North Dakota in 2023¹ represent 13 percent—1 in 7—of the state's total Medicaid enrollees.²
- CHC patients enrolled in Medicaid include more than:
 - 6,000 Medicaid enrollees who are children under age 18,
 - 8,000 adults age 18 and older, and
 - 1,200 who are dually enrolled in Medicare and Medicaid
- Overall, 4 in 10 (40 percent) patients were covered by Medicaid.¹
- Medicaid accounted for 29 percent of patient care revenue charges in 2023.¹

CHCs Economic Impact on Communities

- CHCs in North Dakota created good jobs of many types, employing 368 total FTEs in 2023.¹
- These health care providers generate millions of dollars in positive economic impact in local communities.³

Impact of Medicaid Losses on CHC Patients and Care

Medicaid funding reductions now being considered by Congress would be devastating for patients and CHCs' ability to furnish care, resulting in widespread loss of insurance by health center patients as the state loses federal funding critical to maintaining program operations, and a crippling loss of Medicaid revenue needed to maintain CHC operations and staffing, followed by widespread reductions and closures.
